Applications are invited for a Stipendiary Lectureship in Law, tenable for 12 months from 1 October 2026 to 30 September 2027.

UNIVERSITY COLLEGE

About University College

University College, commonly known as Univ, was established in 1249 and has a claim to be the oldest college in Oxford. Today, the College is at the forefront of promoting diversity and excellence in Oxford, fostering a friendly and inclusive community based around its historic town-centre quadrangles. The College is particularly proud of its record in establishing fully-funded postgraduate scholarships, of which more than 30 are available each year, and of its programmes to challenge under-representation in the student body, the Univ Opportunity Programme and the Univ Beacon Programme. The College comprises approximately 450 undergraduates, 220 postgraduates, and 100 members of academic staff, including Statutory Professors, Tutorial Fellows, and Postdoctoral Research Fellows.

The Master of the College is Baroness Valerie Amos, former United Nations Under-Secretary-General for Humanitarian Affairs and former Director of SOAS University of London. Among the Fellows of the College are six Professorial Fellows, some thirty-two Tutorial Fellows and eleven non-Tutorial Fellows, as well as up to seven Junior Research Fellows at any one time. All these categories of academics are members of the Senior Common Room (SCR), which provides intellectual, dining and social benefits.

Law at University College

The College has two Fellows and Tutors in Law, Professor Angus Johnston and Professor Jacob Rowbottom. Professor Johnston currently teaches primarily in European Union Law and The Law of Torts. His current research includes Competition Law, Energy Law, EU and Comparative Law. Professor Rowbottom currently teaches Constitutional Law and Administrative Law. His research interests include media law, freedom of expression and the legal regulation of the democratic process.

Each year, the College expects to admit up to 10 students for Law, including Law with Law Studies in Europe. The College also accepts graduate students to read for the BCL, MJur and MSc in Law and Finance, as well as a range of research degrees. The post-holder will work under the administrative supervision of Professor Rowbottom.

Teaching

The successful candidate will be required to undertake a stint of four weighted hours of tutorials per week to undergraduates in Law, averaged over three eight-week terms. Tutorials involve a group of typically 3 students who have been asked to complete an assignment which is the basis for the tutorial meeting.

The candidates should be able to teach to offer tutorials and/or classes in any two subjects from Contract Law, Trusts, Land Law and Administrative Law. For further details of the Oxford Law degree, see the departmental website:

Other College duties

The postholder will be required to:

- participate in the annual undergraduate admissions process in weeks 9 and 10 of Michaelmas term;
- participate in the administration of students studying the BA in Jurisprudence and the BA in Law with Law Studies in Europe in the College;
- undertake pastoral duties in relation to undergraduate and graduate students in Law at University College;
- set and mark termly college examinations for undergraduates (these are known as 'collections');
- hold start-of-term and end-of-term meetings with the undergraduates, and conduct students' termly progress reviews at University College;
- advise on students' paper choices;
- co-ordinate students' tuition for modules taught outside the college;
- teach some of their hours for other Oxford colleges as part of a reciprocal teaching arrangement, where appropriate;
- take part in Open Days at University College;
- attend College events for undergraduates and graduates;
- attend the annual academic progress reviews with the Master and the Dean of Graduates and act as College advisor to graduate students if invited to do so.
- undertake related duties in respect of the College's undergraduate and graduate students in Law.

SELECTION CRITERIA

1. A graduate degree in Law or be enrolled on a research degree;
2. A record of successful teaching within the field of appointment. The selection committee recognises that the successful candidate may have little or no experience of small-group tutorial teaching. Evidence of relevant training may be an advantage;
3. A willingness to provide pastoral support to undergraduate students within the College;
4. A willingness to accept a role in the administration of Law at the College, including the annual undergraduate admissions process;
5. A strong research record or research potential within the field of appointment.

TERMS OF APPOINTMENT

The stipend will be in the range £11,270-£12,446 p.a. (depending on experience). This is a fixed-term post for twelve months (in the first instance) only.

The following additional benefits are available at University College:

- Lunch and dinner in the Senior Common Room free of charge throughout the academic year, except when the kitchens are closed;
- Membership of USS pension scheme;
- Use of a teaching room.
